If you have high school students with a love of learning and a desire to make a difference, we hope you'll let them know about George Mason University's new accelerated teacher education program.

The "Bachelor's/Accelerated Master's" program provides Mason undergraduates with a pathway for earning their

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bachelor's degree, teaching license, and master's degree in just five years. It's a smart option and a great reason for choosing Mason.

Students receive many advantages:

- Save up to a full year of tuition costs
- Eliminate the need to wait and apply separately to graduate school
- Maximize their time and effort by counting courses toward both their bachelor's and master's degrees
- Qualify for higher salaries and more opportunities as a teacher immediately upon graduation

In just five years, students can complete two degrees and meet the Virginia requirements to teach:

- Elementary Education
- Secondary Education (English, Math, Social Studies, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, or Earth Science)
- Special Education

Every step of the way, the advisors in Mason's **College of Education and Human Development** will help students chart the best and quickest path for achieving their academic and career goals. In addition to the accelerated program, Mason offers several other pathways to becoming a licensed teacher.

(Students who begin their college experience at a community college are also welcome to apply to the Bachelor's/Accelerated Master's program upon acceptance into Mason.)

The College of Education and Human Development at Mason is one of the most renowned and respected in the region. The college has deep relationships with the world-class school systems in Northern Virginia, and it is estimated that one-third of teachers and one-half of administrators from area schools are Mason graduates, including Virginia's 2014 Teacher of the Year. In addition, the Virginia Center for Excellence in Teaching will open on the Fairfax campus in June.

As you guide your students in the college search process during this busy fall, I want to take this opportunity to share with you some exciting news and updates about the **Honors College** at George Mason University. I hope this information is valuable to your students as they consider applying to Mason!

The Honors College is designed to provide academically gifted students the opportunity to challenge themselves in small sized courses led by some of the best faculty Mason has to offer. Students also benefit from advantages including: priority



registration, one-on-one advising, and a specially-designed Honors College Living Learning Community (LLC). With Washington, D.C. just next door, students gain unique access to internships,

research experiences, and special events, as well as all of the resources of a diverse, residential campus.

Our Honors College students continually impress us with their accomplishments. To highlight their achievements, here are a few recent examples of what our students are up to:

- Awarded Fulbright Teaching Fellowship to Uruguay
- Interned at the U.S. Department of Justice's Human Rights and Special Prosecutions Section
- Conducted molecular data research at the Smithsonian Institution's Natural Museum of Natural History's Vertebrate Zoology group
- Awarded State Department Critical Language Scholarships to study Turkish and Russian
- Researched East African technology, culture and development in Tanzania through a National Science Foundation grant

If you have students who may be a good fit for the Honors College at Mason, please encourage them to submit the **Honors College supplement** in the application to Mason by **November 1** (non-binding Early Action). Mason received a record number of applications last year, so please be advised that the admissions process for Honors College consideration is competitive, and space

Profile of a Patriot: Gaining New Perspective with Wounded Warriors

Walter Reed's Military Advanced Training Center (MATC) on my last day was probably one of the saddest times I've had in a while. I made incredible friends and experienced things that I never thought were even plausible. I even met some celebrities including Prince Harry—who stopped in to visit the wounded warriors.



I spent three weeks and 120 hours in the Amputee Care Physical Nicole Clark, with actor Joe Mantegna, during her internship.

Therapy section of the MATC at Walter Reed. The extent of the injuries ranged from below the knee unilateral amputees to full-quad amputees to traumatic brain injury. Despite the injury, each warrior believed that their injuries were nothing and would always comment on how others had it worse. The resiliency and life in these patients were so evident upon entering the facility. It was humbling to see how hard these patients would work to get better. They may have a bad day, but the fight was always there.

Some patients were injured as long as 10 years ago or as short as a few weeks ago. During my three weeks, each warrior made noticeable progress. This made me smile every day. My four-hour roundtrip commute of driving and a metro ride seemed horrible on day one, but it was soon evident that I didn't care how inconvenienced I was because I just wanted to be in the MATC helping these warriors get back to a point where they could move on with their lives.

Each patient was not bashful in telling me the story of how they became injured

and the specifics of their injuries. All of the injuries were different and involved very innovative medical procedures. I was informed on many of these and the possible implications of each one. I learned more about prosthetics than I ever thought I would and can look at prostheses now and identify the brand and function.

The hardest thing for me was coming from an internship in a strength and conditioning facility where hands-on interaction was encouraged and expected. When working in a physical therapy facility, students are not allowed to instruct, coach, manipulate, or aid in the actual physical therapy experience. Our role is to observe, ask questions, and talk with patients. I found that I would want to get involved more than was allowed, but legally I couldn't. Despite this, I participated as much as I

could and asked more questions than my supervisor anticipated I would.

The most important thing that I learned during this internship is that clients will only give you as much as you believe that you are giving them. If they don't think you care, then the chances of them caring are minimal. It's important to engage with patients and ask questions about their personal life. It's even more important to remember these details and ask follow-up questions. Once patients found out that I cared about them on a personal level and that I would treat them like a person, and not a patient, they were more likely to open up to me, and I immediately would see an increase in their motivation level. Having a genuine care for patients is so important!

I wish my time could be extended on site, but I made some amazing relationships, and many of the warriors have asked me to come back to visit whenever I can. I plan to keep in touch with all of my patients as they move forward and continue with their lives.
